## Primary Health Care

 Primary care - the provision of integrated, accessible, health care services by clinicians that address a large majority of personal health care needs, develop partnerships with patients and practice within the context of family and community



## Principles of Family Medicine

- Patient doctor relationship
- Community Based
- Resource to the community
- Clinical Excellence

 Care for the whole person as situated in their family and community, over time.



## Primary Care.

- Prevention of disease
- Early Identification of disease or risk factors
- Treatment of acute disease
- Support over a life time in a personal relationship
- Door opening to secondary and tertiary care
- Rehabilitation





## Canadian Recommendations

- The Canadian Task Force on the Periodic Health Exam found that there was fair evidence that case finding, counselling and follow up are effective in managing problem drinking
- Canadian Pediatric Society and 17 co-signees recommends Prevention efforts should target women before and during their childbearing years, as well as those who influence such women, including their partners, families, and the community. All efforts should be: family-centred and culturally sensitive, to address the pregnant woman as well as her partner and family in the context of their community; and *comprehensive*, to draw on all services appropriate to the often complex social, economic and emotional needs of these women







# Canadian Recommendations- College of Family Physicians of Canada

- The primary care physician is involved in screening for alcohol use in pregnant women, referral for diagnosis, follow-up and linking patients to the community resources.
- The primary care physician is a catalyst for prevention of continued exposure and subsequent affected siblings, referrals for diagnostic assessment, and links to services and resources to improve outcome.





## Prevention - TOP guideline Alberta

- Primary Prevention the goal is to have no fetuses exposed to alcohol, thus eliminating the problems of FAS before they ever develop.
- Secondary Prevention seeks to reduce the duration and severity of maternal drinking by identification of the person at risk.
- Tertiary Prevention aimed at reducing the complications, impairments, and disabilities caused by FAS, and includes activities that prevent recurrence of the condition in subsequent children.





## Barriers to effective primary screening

#### **Provider Issues**

- Lack of training
- Uncertain about how to intervene if problem is found
- Time constraints
- Personal discomfort

#### **System Issues**

- shortage of qualified, publicly-funded counselors,
- lack of locally available counseling,

#### **Patient Issues**

- stigma attached to diagnosis
- failure to comply with treatment



## Primary Care In Canada

- Canada wide different models
- Responsibility for a population
- Multidisciplinary Teams
- IM/IT
- Choice
- Improving Access



## **New Model Options**

- Shared Care
- Team based care with improved access to Mental health professionals through partnership with a primary care physician
- Co-location
- Population health Perspective
- Partnership outside of the health system social services, education etc.



## **Primary Care Role**

- Prevention Anticipatory counseling, early identification, primary, secondary and tertiary
- Treatment referral to appropriate centralized services or if appropriate bringing the services to the community
- Support of individual and family
- Maintaining integration in the community
- Long term monitoring







(FASD) - Across the Lifespan

### Factors that can lead to success

- Shift in focus towards population health
- Maintain Continuity of Relationship
- Maintain Community based focus
- Team based care produces wider range of skills and supports
- Partnerships outside of health care combined with strong partnerships within the larger health care system
