#### Prevalence

- Public Health Agency of Canada: 9 in 1000 births
  - from Sampson et al., 1997- US
- Subpopulations: 0.009 to 23.3%
  - Tough and Jack, 2011
- Dependent on method and population characteristics
  - May et al., 2009



### Aboriginal Children's Survey

- 2006 post-censal survey
- Population: estimated 135,000 Aboriginal children (0 to 5 years) living off reserve in Canada



Percentage diagnosed with FASD by region Canadian Aboriginal children aged 0 to 5




Percentage who received treatment for FASD by region Canadian Aboriginal children diagnosed with FASD aged 0 to 5

















Percentage diagnosed with FASD by

Aboriginal children aged 0 to 5 living in Western Canada








Percentage diagnosed with FASD by

Aboriginal children aged 0 to 5 living in Western Canada








Percentage diagnosed with FASD by food insecurity experience

### Summary

- The estimated prevalence rate of FASD among young Aboriginal children living off reserve in Canada is 0.7%.
- Treatment rates were relatively low.
- Children with FASD experience other challenges such as low income, food insecurity, and requiring foster care placement.
